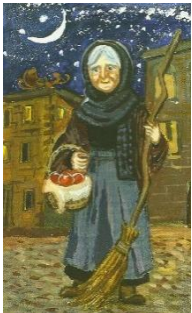




## November 2025 Newsletter

### The Story of Befana

According to legend, many years ago there was a peasant woman, bent with age, who lived alone just out of sight of the camel road between Jerusalem and Bethlehem. Her small cottage was poor, but always clean and well-swept; for Befana worked all day long, scrubbing and cleaning. At the time of Christ's birth, the three wise men stopped by Befana's cottage to ask directions, as they sought the Christ child. They invited her to join them. Befana told them she was too busy sweeping and they went on their way. Afterward, she regretted her hasty decision and tried to follow. But she couldn't catch the three kings. Undiscouraged, she continued searching. Befana searches still.

Riding her broom, she searches every city, town and village. Whenever she comes to the dwelling of a child, she enters to leave a gift, just in case the child is the one she seeks. Her bag is never empty, for as soon as she gives a gift, a new one takes its place.

The legend of la Befana, the gift-giver of Italy, is a "Twelfth Night Tale", because in Italy, the traditional time of gift-giving is not Christmas, as in North America, but the Epiphany, or Twelfth Night, the Feast of the Three Kings.
